Or maybe I found a new friend to play.


Maybe today was the very first time

W/C Monday 11th September - To enable the children to stay for lunch, their hours will be 9:00am - 1:30pm.


W/C Monday 18th September - All Reception children become full time, which is in line with all other classes, 8:50am - 3:15pm.

Supervision at the beginning and end of the school day

What are the times of the morning and afternoon sessions?

Morning: 8:50am - 12:00pm

Afternoon: 1:00pm - 3:15pm



Please collect your child from the classroom at the end of the school day.

If your usual arrangements for collecting your child changes for any reason, please let us know in writing.

Should you arrive at school after 9:00am, or if you need to collect your child at an earlier time, please use the pedestrian path via the car park and report to Mrs Ainsworth or Mrs Mulla at the school office.

Please note the car park is potentially dangerous and children should be closely supervised there.



Uniform and PE Kit

All children should wear their winter uniform when the Autumn term starts in September. School uniform can be purchased from our Marks & Spencer website or from the Wirral Uniform Centre in Birkenhead

All items of uniform and coats should be clearly labelled with your child's name! Any uniform that cannot be identified, will be sent to lost property. Lost property is located in the bike shed.

- White blouse
- Grey skirt / trousers or pinafore dress
- Royal blue cardigan or jumper
- Yellow and blue striped tie
- White knee length socks or grey tights
- Black shoes
- Coat with hood

- White shirt
- Long or short grey trousers
- Royal blue v-neck jumper
- Yellow and blue striped tie
- Grey socks
- Black shoes (with velcro fastening)
- Coat with hood

On PE days, we ask that pupils attend school wearing their PE kits - this helps to ensure the lesson can start on time. Your child should come into school dressed in their white t-shirt, blue shorts, navy blue jumper and velcro fastening pumps/trainers. Parents will be informed which days are PE days.

Snack Time & Lunches

We have snack time each morning in our classroom. We provide a small variety of fruit for the children to choose from. You can also sign up for milk with the Cool Milk scheme. Please go on the website to do this.

Each child in Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 will be offered a free hot meal or a choice of sandwiches and salad for lunch. This system is called universal free school meals. Charges for school meals taken effect when your child reaches Year 3. If you do not wish for your child to have a hot dinner, please provide them with a packed lunch.

Our menus are available to view on our school website and the school calendar (the menu changes week to week on a 3 weekly rota).

Please also provide your child with a water bottle, clearly labelled with their name.







Phonics

Phonics is a way of teaching children to read quickly and skillfully. Children will have phonics lessons daily targeted to their level by a fully trained Read, Write Inc. teacher. This may not be Miss Morton.

I will hold a Parents Phonics Workshop in the Autumn term to let you know more!

Flavour School



Flavour School is about exploring food and flavour through the senses. Our programme links to our early years curriculum as we develop skills in **all** learning. Our approach is a fun and simple way to help children learn about the senses, taste and flavour, in order to give them more confidence and curiosity to try new things- a fundament building b lock for developing healthy attitudes to foods and eating.

Flavour School is unique to Oxton St Saviour's CE Primary and therefore requires funding. We politely ask for £2.50 per child for the year, which works out at £7.50 a term and approximately £1.25 a week. We hope you agree that this is a great experience to develop in the different areas of the early years curriculum.

Forest School

Forest School can help children to develop:

- self-awareness.
- motivation.
- empathy.
- social skills.
- communication skills.
- independence.
- self-esteem and confidence.
- physical skills including the development of both gross and fine motor skills.

Waterproofs and wellies welcome! Wellies can go on our welly stand, which stays in school. You can of course take them back home if you want, at any point. Please can waterproofs be placed in a spare bag.

Reception Baseline Assessment

In the first 6 weeks of school, I will complete the statutory Reception Baseline Assessment (RBA) on all of the children.

Behaviour Policy

We are READY to learn: we arrive at school on time; we have our equipment ready and we show that we are listening.

We are RESPECTFUL: we listen when others speak and we respect the property of our friends and the school.

Children are rewarded for positive behaviour with Dojo points, and Praise Assembly awards.

We also use coloured behaviours to help the children understand our behaviour expectations.
